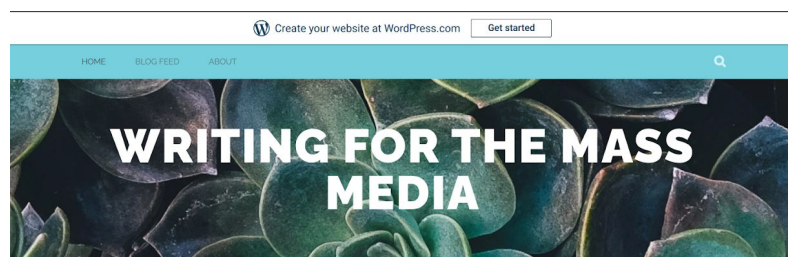

For this CMS exploration, we took a look at WordPress. The platform is mainly a blogging software, but offers ecommerce, portfolio, and other essential features needed for businesses and other companies and organizations to thrive online. WordPress offers a free site domain to users for one year, with any plan they decide to use. If someone chose the main free option, they would only have their site for one year before it would be deleted, unless they bought another plan. This is what I did for the exploration. I started a WordPress blog site last year around this time as an honors module for my mass media writing class. I continued to use it for another class on convergent journalism, as well as a social media class. Since I'd been utilizing my site often and did not want to lose the work I'd put into it, I already knew I was going to purchase a personal plan of \$4 a month, billed annually at \$48.

What my site looked like before I started the exploration.

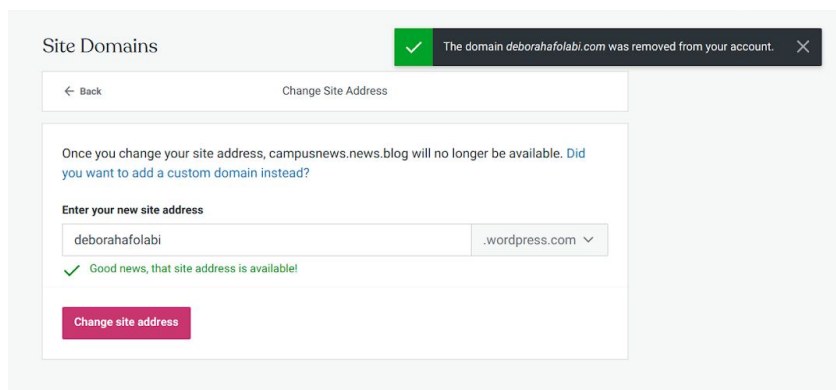
The first thing I did once I was upgraded was accidentally create a whole new domain. I'd actually just wanted to change the site address of my blog, a setting I came across once I realized I had not, in fact, changed the address of my site. I did delete the created domain, as it cost an extra \$18/year in addition to my WordPress plan after one year free, and I didn't really need it. One thing I did find that I did not like, was that I could not change the domain name of my site. It either had to be .wordpress or the domain of my original site: .news.blog. I opted for .news.blog, but I wish it could have been .com, which is what I had on the domain I accidentally created at the beginning.

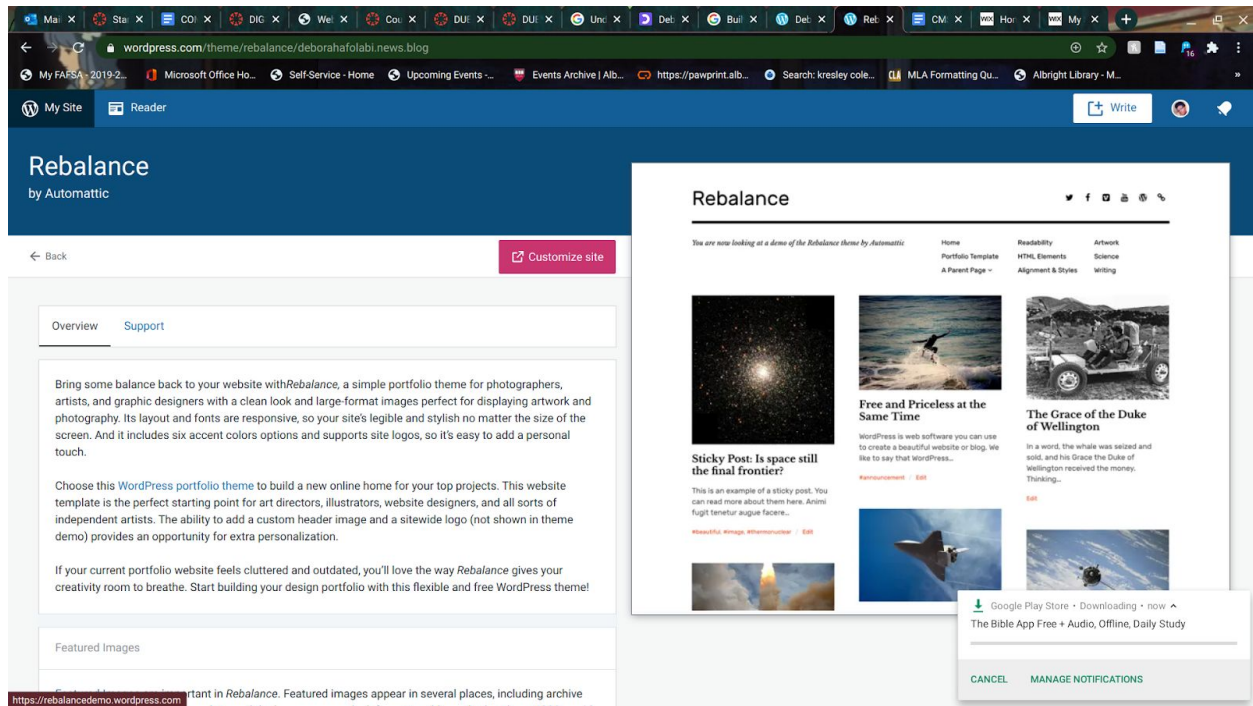

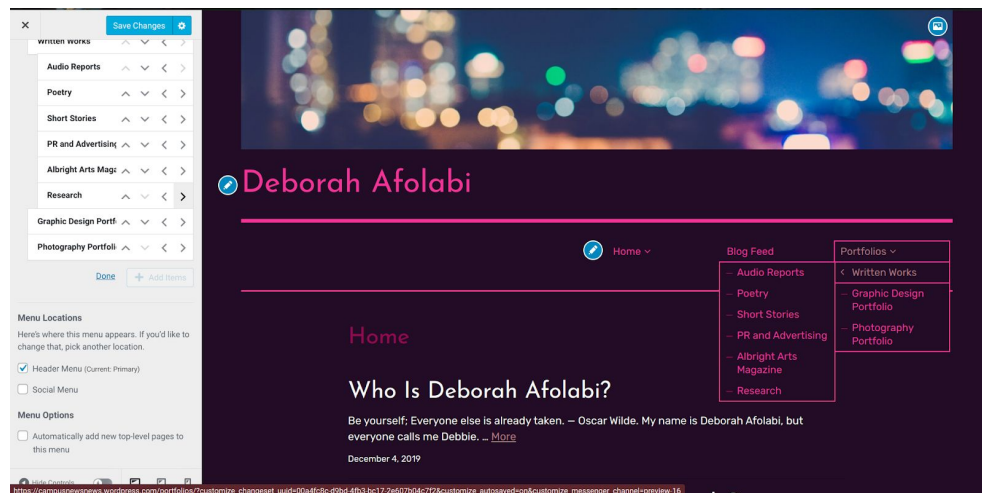
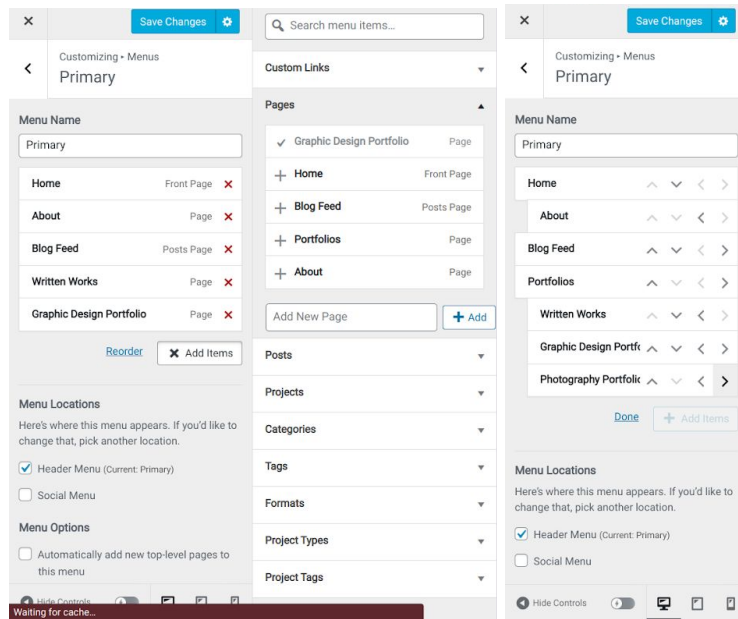

The next thing I did was a rebranding of my site. I selected a new theme template first: Rebalance. I selected this theme exactly for what it is known for: balance. I also really liked how it used a grid-like format for the blog feed. My original blog feed was an endless stream of the entire posts, instead of the main image, the title, and an excerpt. My original theme was Plane.



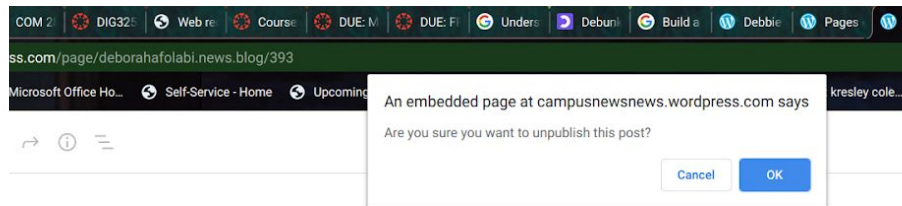
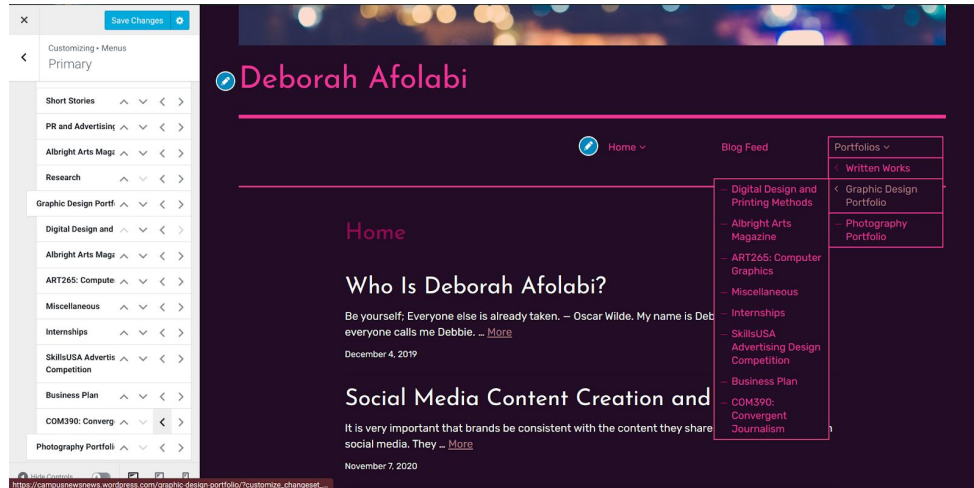
The theme template I selected.

The last thing that cinched the theme for me was the menu. I really liked how balanced it looked at the top of the screen, even though there were many pages. This menu led me to the Customizer in order to add more pages to my site, which I couldn't do before in the free version. I added a portfolios page to my site, in addition to my home, about, and blog feed page (which I still cannot edit, even with a plan). Something cool I found while editing my menu in the Customizer was that I can nest pages under other pages, creating dropdown menus. I nested my about page under home first. My WordPress exploration is supposed to be my writing portfolio, so I made pages for each category of works (as designated on my original portfolio) and nested them under a main "Written Works" page.



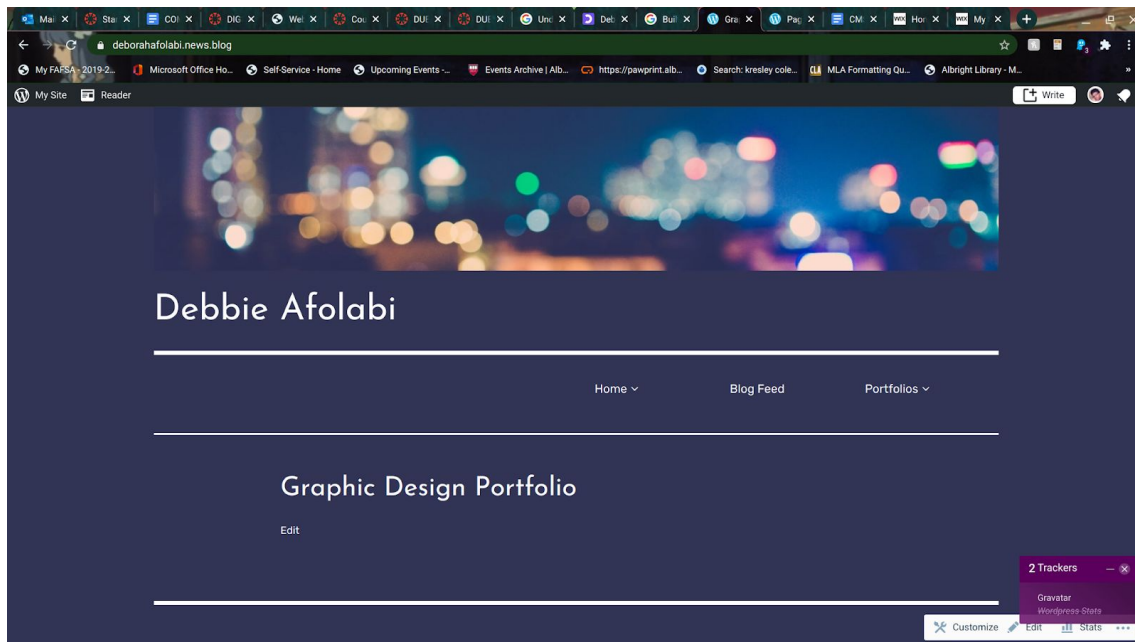
Adding more pages to my site, creating dropdown menus.

I do intend to use this site as my main portfolio site, so I did the same for my graphic design work, but intentionally left all those pages blank. Once you add a page, it automatically becomes live, so I went back through and unpublished all the pages associated with my graphic design portfolio by making them drafts. However, since the pages are still part of the menu, they all still show up and are clickable.



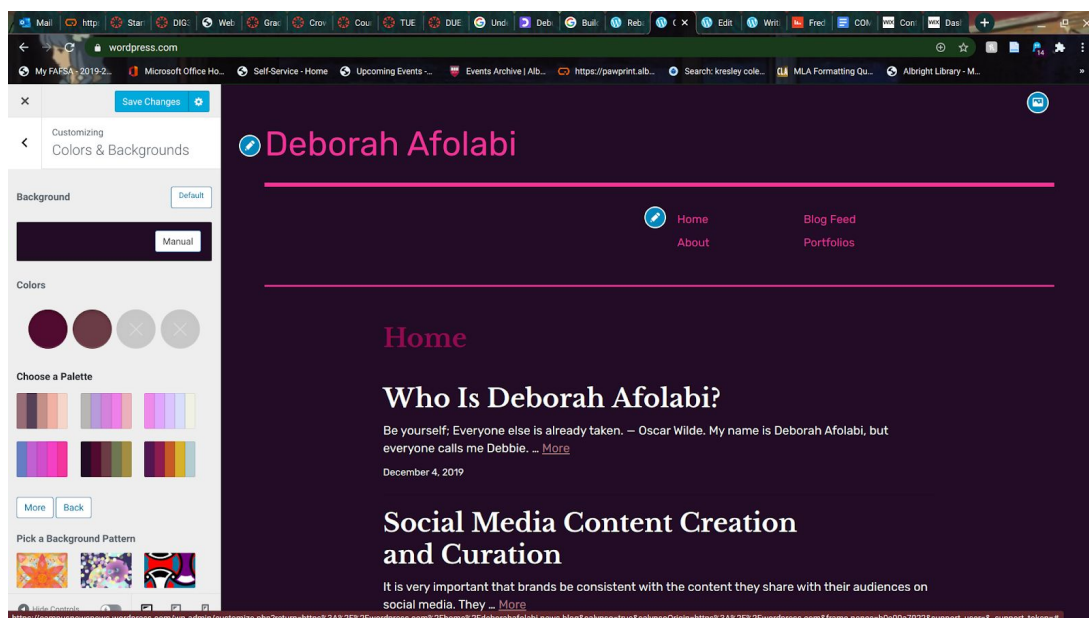
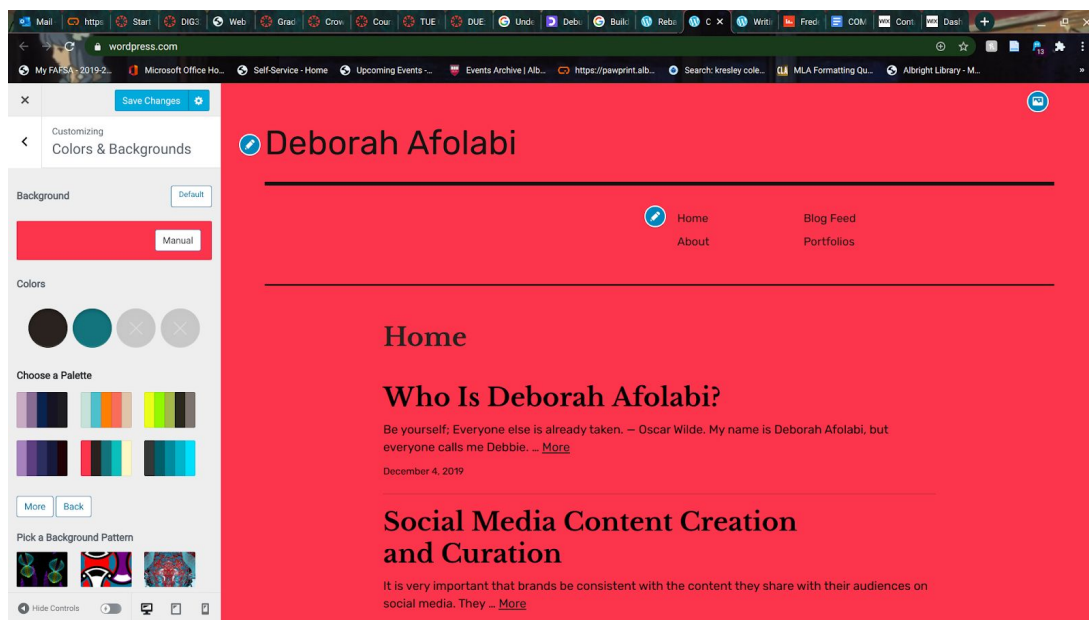

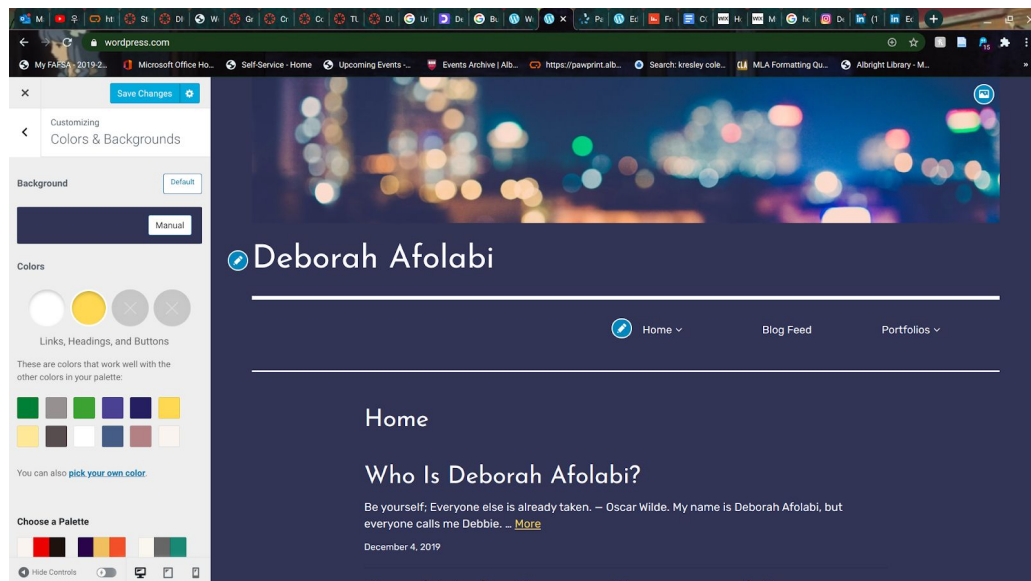
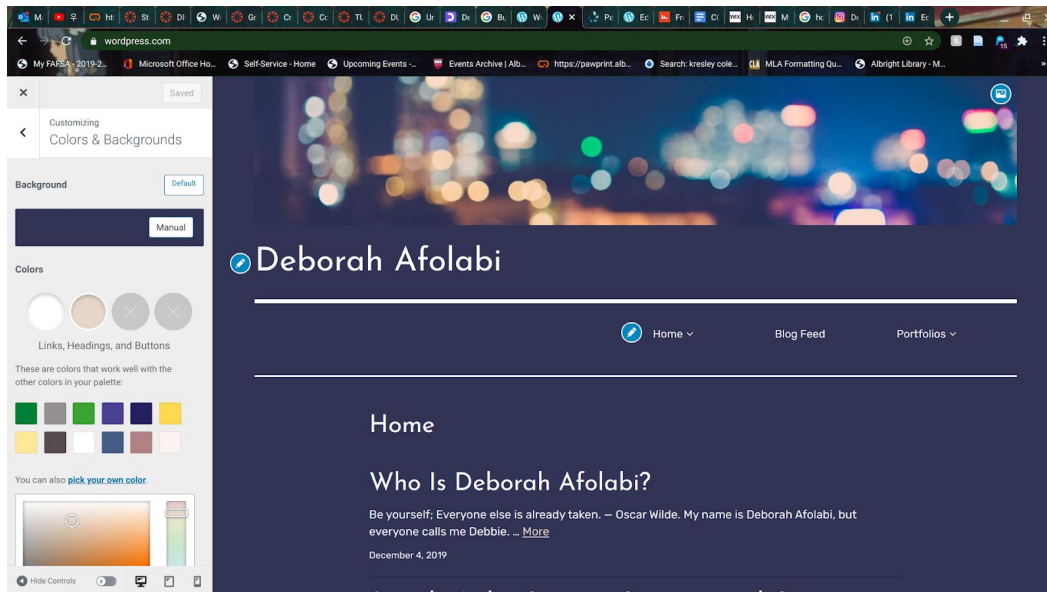
My graphic design portfolio dropdown menu and making the associated pages drafts in an attempt to make them unseeable. However, as shown by the last image, the pages are still visible.

I like both dark and bright colors so I wanted to utilize those themes as best as I could in my site. So the next thing I took a look at was the color theme. I played around with the background palettes several times in my process of making my site. The first time, I settled on a pink text and elements on a dark burgundy background. I thought it was alright, but realized soon enough (and during class) that it was not a good option. I found that I could change the color of the text on each individual page (white was the best choice), but ultimately the color palette itself was not ideal.

After several attempts to change other elements on the site due to color restrictions, I went back to the drawing board. This time I found that I could match the palette to the header image, which helped tie in my site beautifully. There was still an issue of text, but going through each page individually and changing the text to white (and the white background of editor mode no less) was not a good use of time. I found that in the Customizer, after you'd selected your palette, you could fix the entire site at once by clicking on the two color circles of the palette. The first circle controlled the color of the text, while the second one was for links, widgets, and other features.

The last thing I worked on was the content of the site itself. My home and blog feed pages did not need any changes. On my about page, I changed the link of the Instagram icon from my personal account to my photography account which I started about a week ago. I also changed the paragraph about my portfolio site, leading visitors to the new portfolio pages of my site and my WIX photography portfolio site.

One main issue I ran into was adding documents to the site. My original portfolio site allowed me to upload PDFs, taking thumbnail snapshots of the works as previews. I did not want my portfolio pages to look like how my blog feed used to, and I especially did not want to copy and paste multiple page documents into my site, and lose formatting of them. I spent a good while trying to figure out how to figure this out, even almost changing the layout of pages.

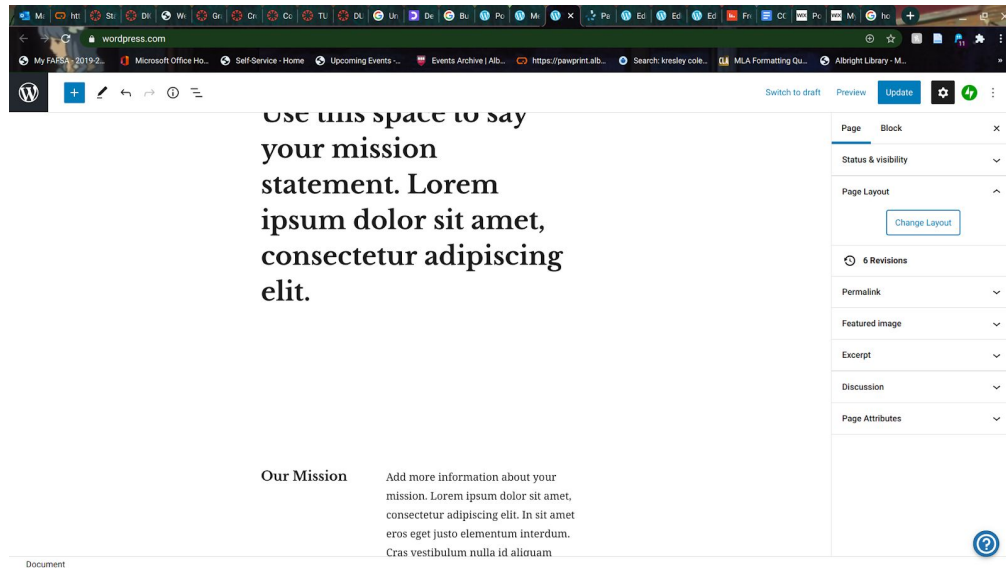

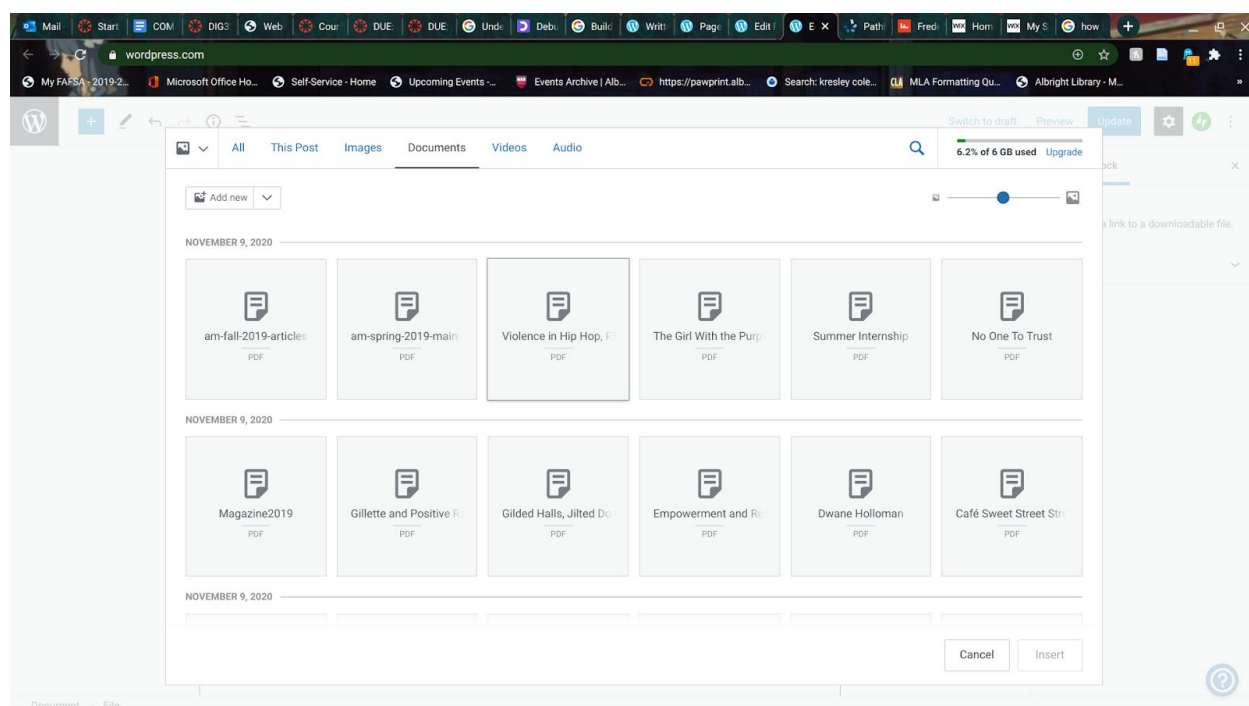
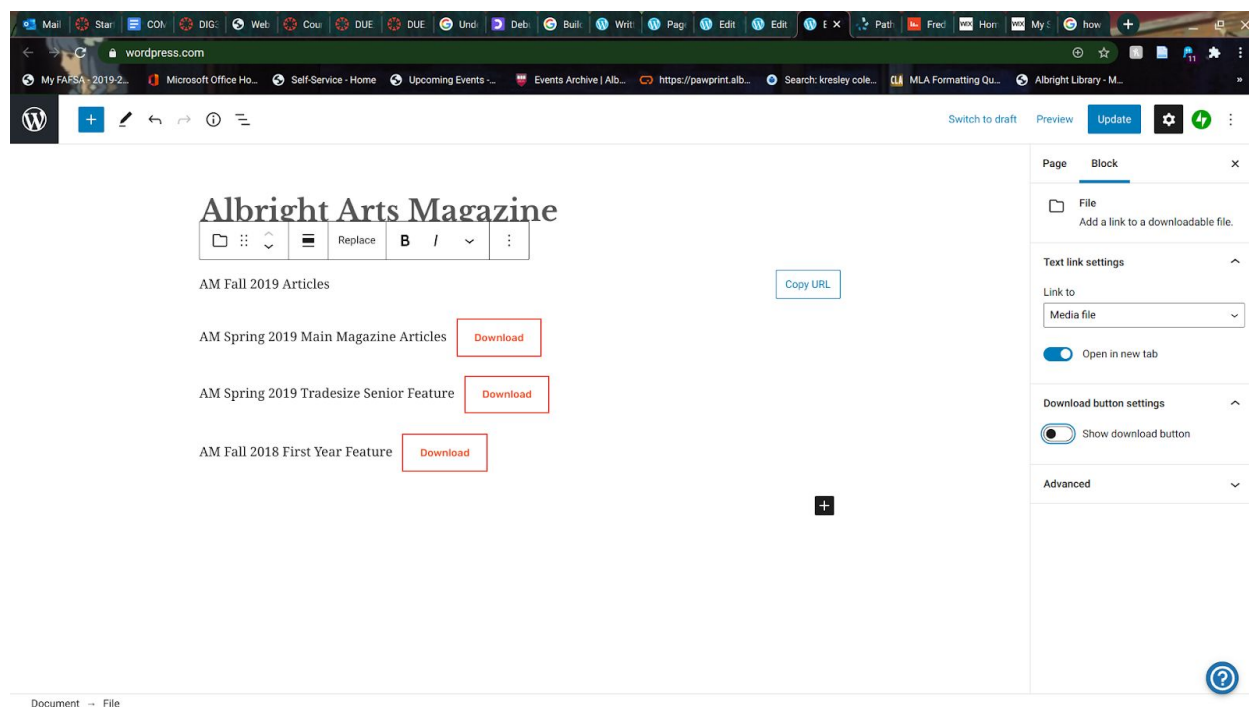

Playing with page layouts to try and figure out how my written works should look.

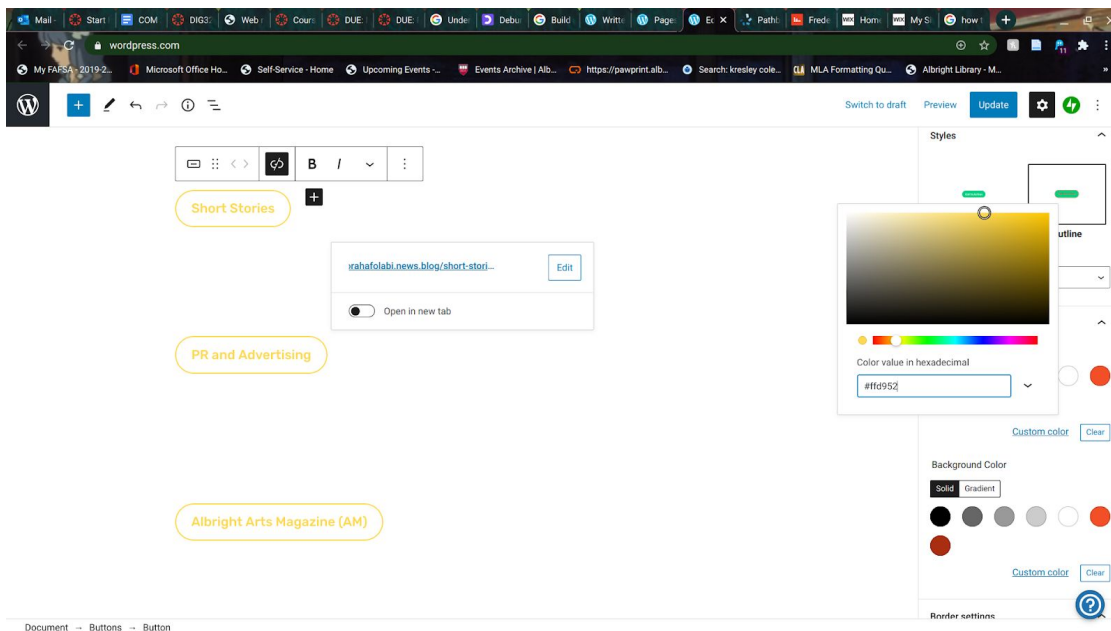
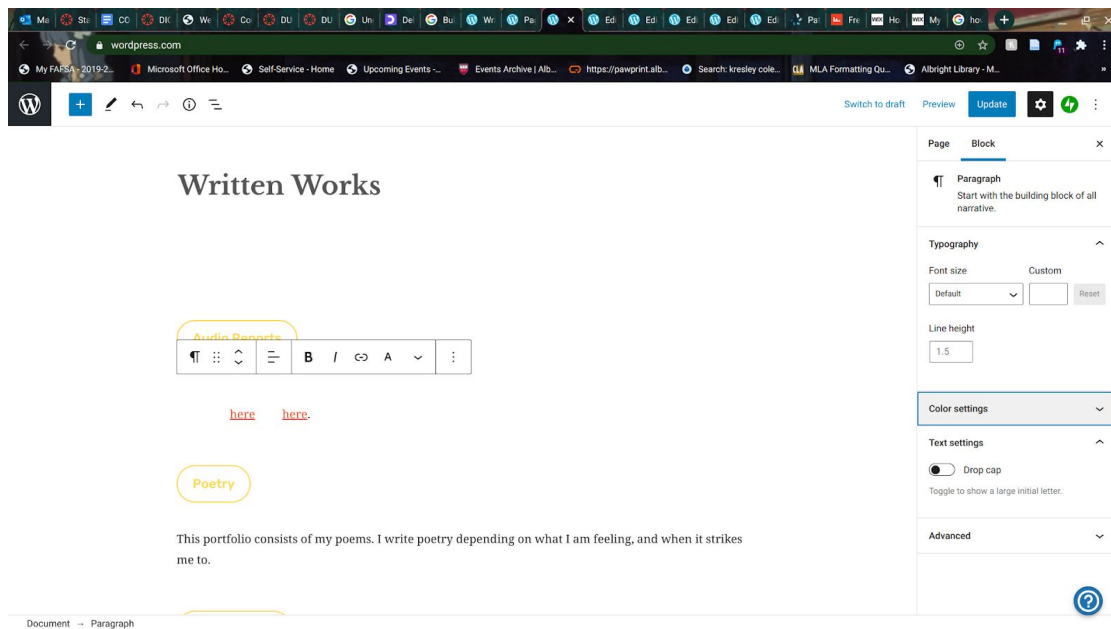
Eventually, I did find that I could add documents to my media library, thanks to Google and WordPress blog. I can add documents to my media library and there is a file block in which you add files that can be downloaded by visitors. Although I only put a few of my works on the site and not all, there will be more so I think the download list method was the best. The colors of the links match the color scheme and I was able to hide the actual “download” button, which I did not like. It did not match the color scheme of my site and I could not edit it to match either, but I could hide it which was perfect. In addition, I also made all the links open on a new page, as that is something I think would benefit visitors so they don’t have to go back to where they were after opening the file. I also added my resume as a file to my about page.

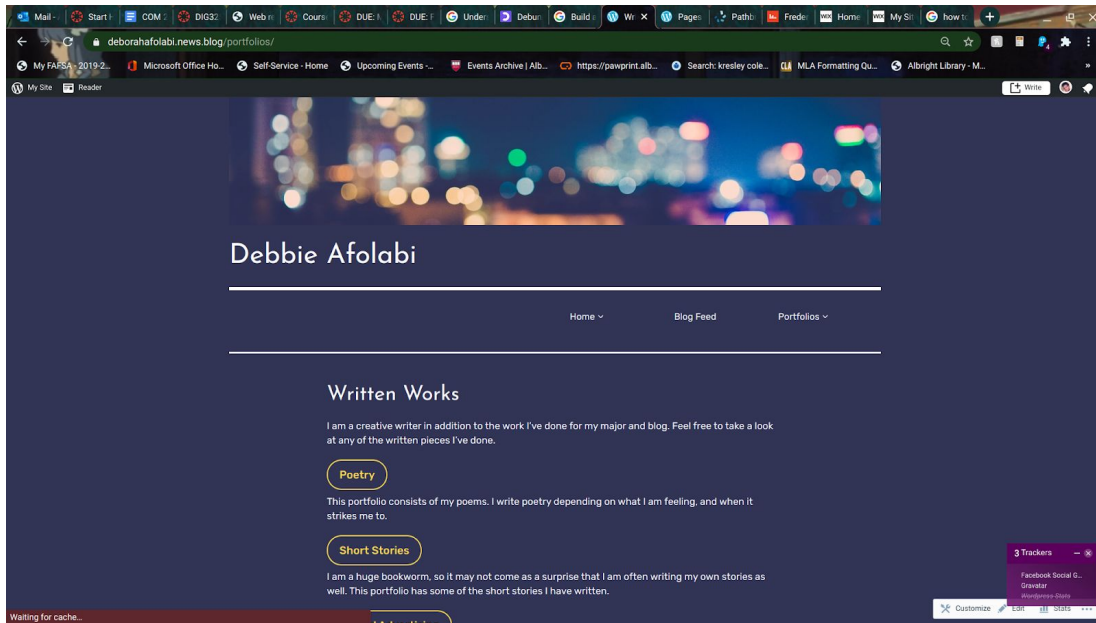


Adding documents to my site.

In addition, I made my “Written Works” page a landing page for all the category pages of my writing portfolio. It was here that I discovered buttons. I added buttons for each of my portfolio categories, and made the link for each button its respective page on my site. Under each button, I added a little blurb about what the portfolio category featured, as well as an overall

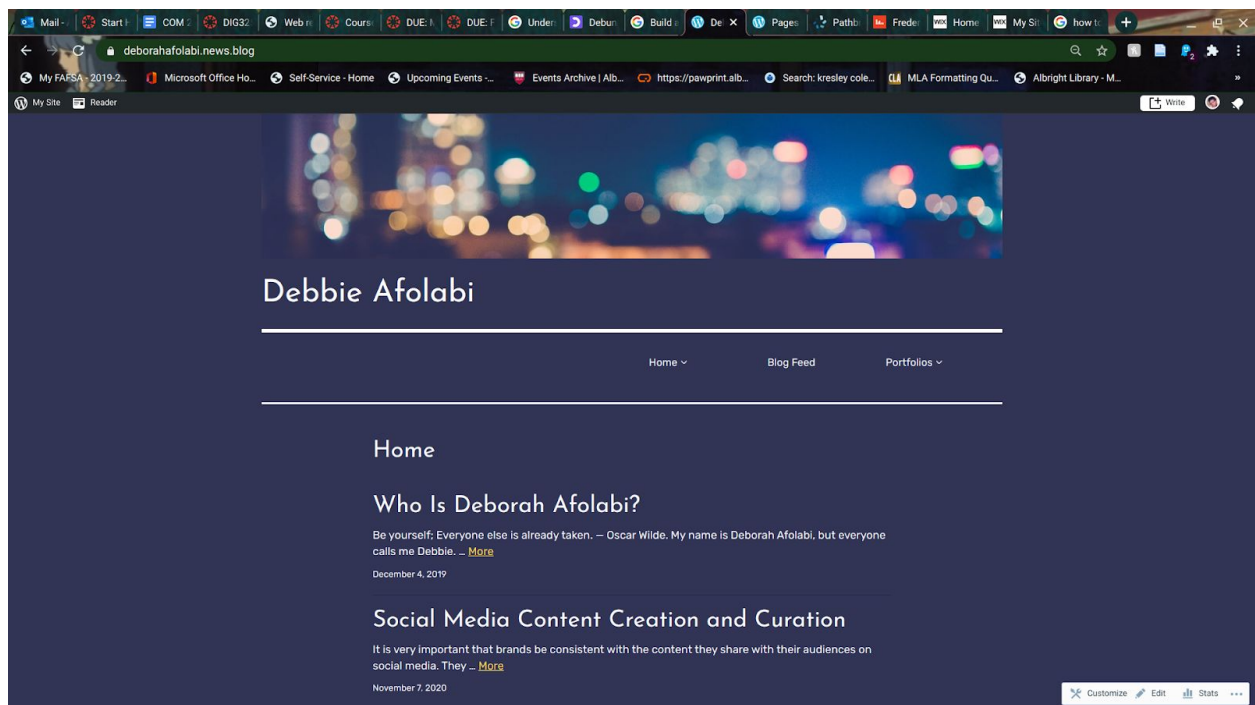
blurb for the entire portfolio at the top. In addition, I went back to the Customizer so I could find the exact code for the link colors as the buttons do not automatically follow the color scheme. But at least I could edit them; I made the outlines so the color wasn't too much on the site, and made the color the same yellow as all the links on the site.

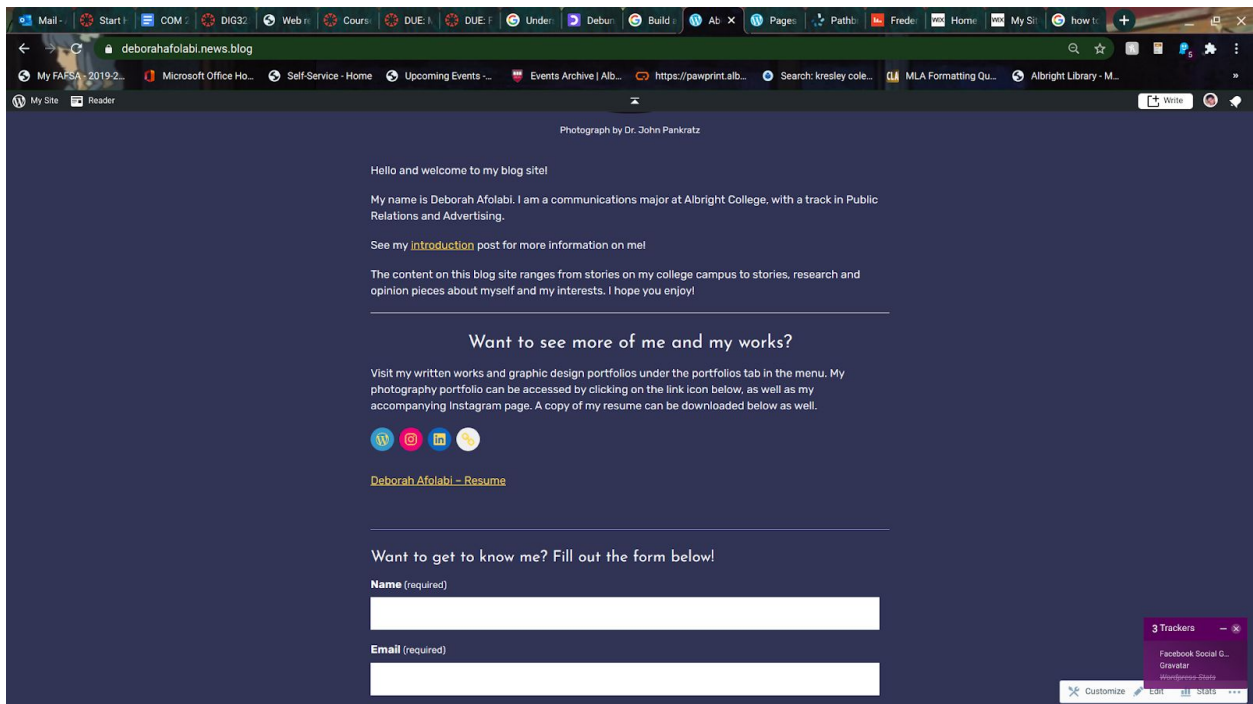
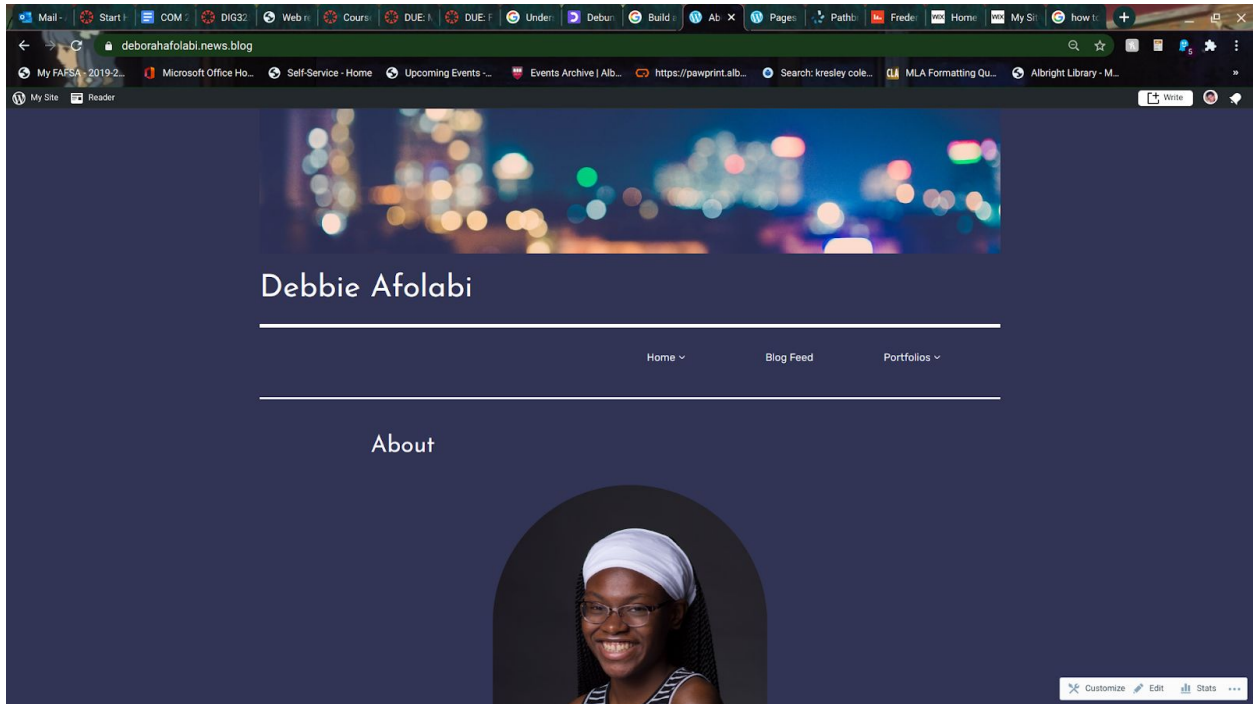




My Written Works page with the edited buttons, as well as how I made them that way.

I am a huge bookworm, so it may not come as a surprise that I am often writing my own stories as well. This portfolio has some of the short stories I have written.

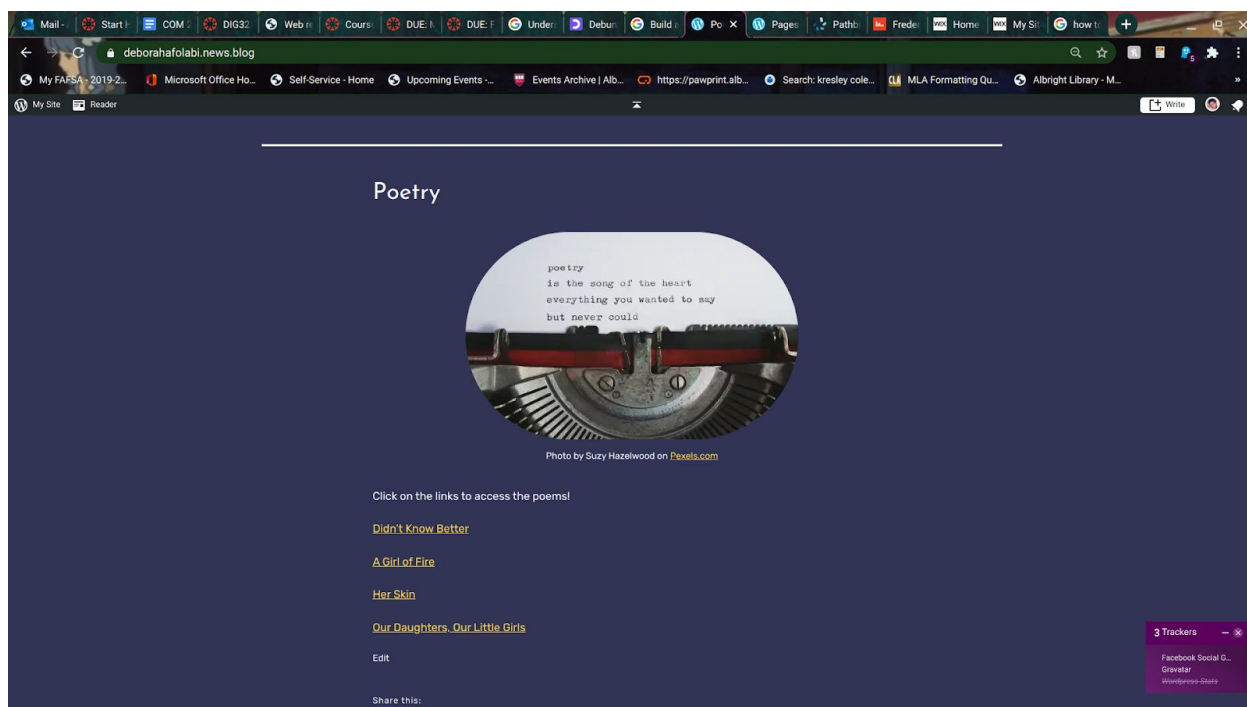
